Five members of the Italian Tesla owners club claim to have set a new distance record, travelling 670 miles on a single charge in a Tesla Model S.
The team said they drove without air conditioning at an average speed of just 25mph (40kmph), reaching 670 miles before coming to a stop with 0% charge on the meter.
To complete the 1,078km record distance, they used 98.4kWh of electricity, which is equivalent to eight litres of gas.
This has been possible thanks to the very high output of the electric engine that transforms 95% of the energy into motion as compared to the most efficient combustion engines today which do not exceed 30% efficiency.
Tesla's latest car, the \$35,000 Model 3, is regarded as being able to travel 215 miles per charge as standard or up to 310 miles with an extended range battery option, which costs more. But electric cars still have some way to go to match petrol and diesel cars, which normally exceed 500 miles per tank of fuel and can be refilled in minutes, with even the fastest electric chargers taking over an hour
to fully charge the large batteries.

Nepal plans to measure Mount Everest
Nepal is going to spend two years measuring Mount Everest because its official height may have
changed following the devastating April 2015 earthquake in the region.
The country's *Department of Survey says the mountain, measuring 8,848 metres based on previous
surveys, may also have shifted its geographic position, the <i>Kathmandu Post</i> reports. The two-year
task will also show the impact of climate change on the mountain, and will cost 140 million rupees,
the paper says.
Measurements will be taken from three locations around the mountain, but sherpas will also have to
carry equipment to the summit for reaching a final conclusion.
The Nepalese mission isn't the only attempt to measure Everest at the moment. The Survey of India
announced their plan to take on the task last week. However, they may now team up with Nepal to
see if the 2015 earthquake indeed shrunk Everest.

Japan's elderly offered funeral discount to stop driving
The Japanese authorities have been trying to encourage older people to give up driving after a recent
series of accidents, some of which involved drivers confusing the accelerator and the brake pedals.
The latest incentive is in the central Aichi Prefecture, where a company that runs 89 funeral homes
is offering a 15% discount for those who give up their licences.
Anyone wanting to take advantage of it has to provide evidence that they have handed in their licence
at the local police station, which is supporting the initiative. The discount can be extended to family
members, including those who live outside the prefecture.
In 2015, there were almost 4.8 million licence holders over the age of 75, twice as many as a decade
earlier. The same period saw an increase in the number of fatal collisions involving elderly drivers.
Similar incentive systems are operating elsewhere in Japan, although most aren't quite so morbid -
some involve cheaper taxi rides or cut-price entry to public baths.

Russians who want to impress their social media followers can now rent huge bouquets of flowers for just long enough to snap an Instagram photo.

The service is advertised on pop-up windows on social networks before the International Women's Day on 8 March, a public holiday in Russia when women are traditionally celebrated with flowers and other gifts. They're offering 10 minutes with an enormous bouquet - enough time to perfect the best angle and pose - before the courier takes it back. One site is offering women a brief visit from 101 roses for 700 roubles.

Posting selfies with huge bouquets, which were seemingly sent by a boyfriend has been a trend among Russian Instagram and other social network users for some time.

The 360TV website contacted the owner of one flower-rental Instagram account, who insisted his service was real and had received many requests. They say the 10 minutes can be extended a little, but not indefinitely. Another account that 360TV contacted turned out to be a joke set up to mock the new trend. An Instagram user even suggests a similar service aimed at men: "A Rolex, two iPhones on the table and a selfie taken in a Moscow office with a panoramic view."

Police in Windhoek will treat those travelling on foot in the same way as drivers if there's a collision

Khoaseb says when pedestrians are hit it's often on weekend nights after people have had a few

#### Ukrainian man survives three days at sea on an inflatable toy

A Ukrainian man has been rescued after he fell asleep on an inflatable toy and drifted out into the Black Sea, it's reported.

Russian coastguards near Crimea responded to a call on 5<sup>th</sup> August and found the 19-year-old security guard Andrej Doroshenko on an inflatable trampoline. He had been shipwrecked without food or water for almost three days, Russia's Ren TV reports.

He had fallen asleep on the inflatable on a beach in southern Ukraine and was swept out to sea shortly afterwards, travelling some 35 nautical miles.

Mr Doroshenko told Ren TV that on the second day, when he couldn't see the shore, he didn't think it was funny anymore. He started crying, he was in shock, and tried to cover himself from the sun as best he could. He called to several passing ships, unfortunately in vain. But someone must have raised the alarm, as he was eventually rescued by coastguards.

A Russian border guard in Crimea said that first of all he was taken to the shore, and then delivered to hospital where he was treated for sun stroke and dehydration, but is now recovering.

Scientists trying to keep trout and salmon out of the deadly turbines of the Grand Coulee Dam are
trying a trick from the days of disco: strobe lights*.
Three high-powered strobes now flash from the bottom of a barge near the dam, creating a curtain of
illumination that scientists hope will scare away trout and salmon. The goal is to keep them in Lake
Roosevelt, the reservoir behind the dam. Whether the strobes will work or not remains to be seen.
The 1930s construction of Grand Coulee Dam, the largest U.S. hydropower producer, brought an end to
$oceangoing fish  runs^{**}  on  the  Upper  Columbia  River,  which  forms  the  southeast  boundary  of  the  Colville$
Indian Reservation. To compensate for the loss of the fish runs, the Bonneville Power Administration
pays for two hatcheries, which dump more than 1 million salmon and 500,000 trout into the 130-mile-
long Lake Roosevelt each year. However, thousands of those fish head downstream annually, and an
estimated 402,000 enter one of the 24 turbines at the dam.
Researchers from the Pacific Northwest National Laboratory in Richland are just starting to
analyse the data from sonar used to track the reaction of the fish.

Icelandic police tell drivers to stop staring at sky
Police officers in southern Iceland say that twice last week they had to stop cars driving unpredictably,
because they suspected that the drivers had been drinking. But on both occasions the entirely sober
visitors were simply mezmerised by the appearance of the Aurora Borealis in the sky above them.
The first incident was on the road to the airport, with the car zigzagging between lanes. "The driver
told the police he saw the Northern Lights and couldn't bring himself to stop looking at them," a police
statement said. The police asked him to park the vehicle if he wanted to keep on gazing at the sky.
Tourists don't always make life easy for Icelanders, especially behind the wheel. In 2015, a policeman
complained that visitors were causing several collisions by stopping their cars abruptly in the middle
of the road in order to photograph sheep, horses "or anything else which captures their attention".
He suggested that creating designated photo stops could ease the problem.
